# What the Coronavirus response reveals about solving the climate crisis: A message from Chuck Willer

We hope you and your loved ones are staying healthy and following best practices for protecting yourself and others during the COVID-19 pandemic. For our part, the Coast Range Association has cancelled all in-person events and we are working from home.

In a few short weeks, the Coronavirus crisis has revealed the generally unseen inner workings of our political economy – namely the monetary system. As I write this message, Congress is approving a **two trillion-dollar economic relief package**. For perspective, the amount is equal to \$6,250 for every person in the US.

The looming larger crisis, global warming, requires emergency level spending like the coronavirus stimulus package. What is stopping transformational spending to address climate change? It's not the federal government's ability to finance the transformation. That is clear from the coronavirus stimulus package. Instead, powerful fossil fuel interests own members of Congress and block funding.

The fact is – the coronavirus pandemic has laid bare that our current economic system does not provide for the people or the planet. We have learned this same lesson in Oregon regarding the timber industry's influence over Salem. Whether it's the economy, the global climate or Oregon's Wall Street dominated forest lands – we must speak out for the common good. The current

unjust economic system impacts everyone and every business sector. In response, the Coast Range Association is actively working to promote systemic change by educating people about a national Green New Deal (GND).

Over the past six months, I have spoken in a number of communities about the climate crisis and the response required by the US government – the GND. My latest talks addressed the funding needed to implement the GND. Most audience members were astounded when the numbers were explained. In fact, whether the issue is universal health care coverage, a guaranteed job or the Green New Deal – the US society can easily afford the programs required.

The GND will provide tools for people and communities to respond to today's multiple crises, including a pandemic like COVID-19. Tools like strong unions, guaranteed health care, and living wages will make our communities more resilient. Democratizing key infrastructure

systems to be more socially responsive will ensure resources are available locally as new challenges occur. We must enact a GND now to ensure we have the resources to address the climate crisis, wealth inequality, and future health crises like COVID-19.

We cannot allow the current pandemic to turn into another power grab by powerful elites. As Naomi Klein states in a recent article on <u>Coronavirus</u> <u>Capitalism - and How to Beat It</u>, "*During moments of cataclysmic change, the previously unthinkable suddenly becomes reality. In recent decades, that change has mainly been for the worst — but this has not always been the case. And it need not continue to be in the future."* 

As a global community, we must quickly identify what truly has value: our communities, healthy food and clean water, affordable, quality health care, our basic infrastructure, secure and well-paying jobs, and safe, energy efficient homes and neighborhoods. Forces that currently dominate the centers of power are surely moving to profit off the global coronavirus crisis. We must do all we can to overcome those who block the required just public response to the crisis.

The Coast Range Association works primarily at the community scale. We stand solidly in support of Co-Op owned forests, regenerative and small-scale farms, local manufacturers and merchants, and civic organizations working to provide for the welfare of people and ecosystems. We trust that local communities can make just decisions for the sustainable use of natural resources while providing for people. We will continue to focus our work on community level solutions while advocating for a national GND mobilization. A better world is possible.

### OSU study: Timber harvests lead to lower summer streamflows

"CORVALLIS, Ore. (KTVZ) – Summer streamflow in industrial tree plantations harvested on 40- to 50-year rotations was 50% lower than in century-old forests, data from the longterm Alsea Watershed Study in the Oregon Coast Range showed. The research, led by Oregon State University's <u>Catalina Segura</u>, is an important step toward understanding how intensively managed plantations might influence water supplies originating in forests and downstream aquatic ecosystems, especially as the planet becomes warmer and drier. Industrial plantation forestry is expanding around the globe, and that's raising concerns about the long-term effects the plantations might be having on water, especially in dry years," Segura said"

"Findings were published in the Journal of Hydrology."
