




Dear friend,

On August 9, 2021 the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) released their <u>Sixth</u> <u>Assessment Report</u>. Again the IPCC reports in the strongest terms, we are living in a climate crisis caused by the burning of fossil fuels and deforestation.

The report starts: "It is unequivocal that human influence has warmed the atmosphere, ocean and land. Widespread and rapid changes in the atmosphere, ocean, cryosphere and biosphere have occurred."

Of course this is not news as we experience daily unrelenting natural disasters from heat waves, megafires, and droughts to ocean acidification, hurricanes, and floods. We know that those who are the most impacted and suffer from these disasters are the most marginalized. We also know that as the crisis increases so does political extremism, creating an us vs. them social landscape pitting neighbor against neighbor. All the while the powerful remain unaccountable for continued fossil fuel subsidies and inaction on meaningful natural forest-carbon solutions.

The U.N. Secretary-General, António Guterres, was clear in his press release about the report: "Greenhouse-gas emissions from fossil-fuel burning and deforestation are choking our planet and putting billions of people at immediate risk," he said. "This report must sound a death knell for coal and fossil fuels, before they destroy our planet."

We have known the science on the impacts of fossil fuels and deforestation on the climate for decades. Why haven't governments acted to advert the worse impacts of this crisis? Fossil fuel companies, investment banks, and timber giants and their high paid lobbying and marketing mercenaries delay and sabotage efforts to avert climate catastrophe. All to increase the wealth of the richest people in the world.

Our state and federal leaders are bending to Wall Street's power. One of Oregon's own, Representative Kurt Schrader, is actively stalling the 3.5 trillion reconciliation bill, a bill that is one of our best hopes to make the transition off fossil fuels for energy and transportation. If he does not support this bill, Schrader's name will be etched into a *stone of infamy and the dammed* his name joining all others in power who did nothing while the world burned.

Join us next week for a rally to push Schrader to act on climate (see details below).

We have a short window to act and advert the worst impacts of a runaway climate. The atmosphere's 1.5 degree celsius carbon budget is nearly spent. The time is now to fight for a just transition off of fossil fuels and end Wall Street forestry and deforestation. We all can work to create a better world where human wellbeing is prioritized over profit. Oregon's forests can be part of the solution, but we must be brave and demand immediate change.


As Greta Thunberg said on a recent Democracy Now interview on the IPCC report:



"This report doesn't tell us what to do. It doesn't say you have to do this, and then you have to do this. It doesn't provide us with such solutions or tell us that you need to do this. That's up for us. We are the ones who need to take the decisions, and we are the ones who need to be brave and ask

the difficult questions to ourselves, like: What do we value? Are we ready to take action to ensure future and present living conditions?

"So, I hope that this can be a wake-up call and that it really gives perspective and that it, once again, can be a reminder that the climate crisis has not gone away, it's only escalating, and it's only growing more intense by the hour."



We no longer have time for blue ribbon panels on climate smart forestry or studies on the expense of transitioning fossil gas infrastructure. There is no political will to pay Wall Street investors to store carbon on their plantation estates while people suffer. For our part, we are building a grassroots network to enact a climate and justice focused forest solution that will store vast amount of carbon in Oregon's forests while improving the material conditions of people's lives.


Coast Range Radio
